## for 20 Years of News

Congratulations Bradenton/Sarasota congregation! The newsletter now known as *Celebration News* began 20 years ago. The first issue of the newsletter was published in January, 1991. The newsletter was introduced with the name *Shifting Sands*. The name was arrived at with the thought that "as the sands are shifted along the shore by the waves which encompass and alter that which they touch, so God and the people who come and go in our church family encompass and alter the life of the Bradenton/Sarasota Congregation." The name was changed to *Celebration News* in the summer of 1995 in anticipation of the Dedication celebration of our church facility in January 1996. The newsletter was published bimonthly until 1995 when it became a monthly publication except for July and August (that was vacation time).

The first issue had six pages of which two of the pages were calendars for January and February activities. It included a message from then pastor, Andrea Cooper. Three Adult Church School Classes were introduced for the new year. Other news items included a treasurer's report and a word search puzzle. Written articles were about four young people (Lisa Hollenbeck (Rodriguez), Heather Skene (Quinn), Ryan Biddulph, and Amanda Chartier who had been baptized in December, an upcoming Tampa Bay District Conference, and notification of the activities that would take place for our Consecration Service to be held in February. Some things haven't changed such as noting birthdays and anniversaries and corrections and updates for the congregational directory.

Many people have contributed throughout the 20 years. Some of them have moved on to other areas while others still continue to contribute news items and articles. We are fortunate to have writers who share their talents with us. One person that has been on the "staff" since it's beginning and indispensable is proof reader, **Jo Fenn-Martin**. She used to do the proof reading during lunch hours and after work - well, sometime even during working hours. Now the drafts are sent to her via e-mail or fax since we both retired.

## Calling All Young Adults!!

"Seize the day...without going crazy!" is the theme for the next Young Adult Retreat on March 18-20 at Deerhaven Retreat Center. The guest speaker will be Tony Chvala-Smith from Independence, MO. He works for the World Church as a scripture and theology specialist. He is a professor at Graceland University and a theology instructor at Community of Christ Seminary. He has traveled to England, French Polynesia, Kenya and Zambia. He likes to cook, travel, read and a good cup of coffee. Lead organizers for the retreat are Karla Van Beek, JaAna Skene Swartz and Christy Stanbury (from Orlando).

Some of the classes that will be available are jewelry making (taught by Karla), tye dye (taught by Megan Chlebina), recreation, parenting, chats with Tony, mini-work day projects, hiking, yoga, and fishing. There will also be a kid's campfire, bunko games, and a movie night. Child care will be provided so parents can enjoy activities without worrying about their children. The second month of the new year is just around the corner. How are you doing with keeping your resolutions? Did you resolve to study the scriptures regularly this year? Did you resolve to start attending the Wednesday evening Praise services weekly? Did you resolve to strengthen your relationship with God during the new year? What does it mean to be the salt of the earth and the light to the world? This teaching of Jesus is part of the Sermon on the Mount and follows the Beatitudes that we studied the last week in January. Found in the 5th Chapter of Matthew, these verses starting with 13 will be explored on February 6. *Let Your Light Shine* will be the focus of the Communion service with Evangelist **Karen Palko** speaking and Elder **Jim Deering** leading the service.

Youth Ministries Day will be celebrated on February 13 with the theme *Grow in God*. Is your relationship with God still growing or does it need a boost? In I Corinthians, Paul tells the people of Corinth that in order to mature in God they must be open to the message of grace and love. Elder **Ginger Robertson** and Priest **Heather Devine** will be sharing about what it takes to grow in God.

Paul's continued efforts to get the people in Corinth on track are described in I Corinthians, Chapter 3. He lays down the foundation of Jesus Christ for them. Paul takes them deeper and deeper in his explanation that *Christ is Our Foundation*. On February 20th, Teacher **Fay Beers** will preside over this service while Elder **Jim Brougher** calls the congregation, as Paul did, to stand as a community of faith.

Seek First the Kingdom is another teaching from the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew, Chapter 6. Verses 24-34 bring us the best known of Jesus' teachings about wealth and worry. In today's culture the acquisition of wealth is expected to be a relief from worry. Jesus is turning the expectations of his followers upside down, and his teaching on this subject is no exception. Elders Elaine Gregg and Marcia Brougher will be sharing thoughts about the kingdom in this February 27th service.

#### **Love Will Win**

The Spirit stirs within me, and I feel the motivation, the desire, to share Jesus with others. I am ready to bring ministry. Oh, that I can transfer what I feel into words spoken under the Spirit's influence. You, Oh God, want to raise up a people of righteousness so that Zion can be. There is no magic to it, and there is no way for it to "just happen." No, it is growing into, changing into, transforming into reality because we *first* love and trust God. And *second* that we believe with all our hearts and minds that it can be, and it can be in me! Would God have called us to this challenge if it cannot be? No, just the promise of Zion makes it be.

But a promise from God without action from me (us) remains a promise unfulfilled. The question is not "What can God do?". The question is "How much of us will we surrender to God so he can do his work in us?". If we are too busy doing what we want to do to allow God to do what he wants to do in us, it can never be done. Spiritual growth is never "against" our will, but only with our permission and openness that we surrender our wants to God's wants for us.

Creator God **owns** us! He created us. He sustains our life moment to moment whether we believe in him or not. His love for his creation is without limits and without end. Nowhere can we run from it and nowhere can we hide from it. Eventually no way or nowhere can we resist it. Love **will** win!

In our worse moments the Spirit knocks on our hearts and asks if we want to be healed and set free. The worse the moment, the harder the Spirit knocks. When the door of the heart is opened even just a crack, light and warmth enter in and something wonderful happens in us. What is hard to believe is why so many refuse to be healed and made whole. Why so many lock and bolt the door of their hearts for fear of the Spirit. Is it guilt? Is it fear? Is it shame? Is it unbelief? Whatever the reason, God's longing to bless is not and cannot be poured out. How painful for God who could save and redeem to be refused the opportunity to do it because one of his creation chooses to stay in brokenness rather than to risk what would happen if they let God in. And so the Spirit whispers and says:

You cried out to Me in your brokenness, and when I answered you would not hear, because you did not want to change.

You wanted Me to "fix" you, but not be part of you.
You wanted to take from Me, but not give back to Me.
How can I, the God of love, bless you but leave you in your brokenness?
If I bless you, or "fix" you and leave you as you now are, your brokenness will return much worse than it now is, because the cause of your brokenness remains untouched, unhealed, and unchanged.
Surrender your heart for healing. Surrender your life for changing.
Surrender your will for transformation.
Then you will have joy, then you will be whole.

## **Prayer Shawl Ministry**

The newly organized **Prayer Shawl Ministry** has been a very active and rewarding program. Eight shawls or lap robes have already been presented to give comfort, solace, warmth, and a reassurance of God's love to someone in need of a blessing. We have received notes from recipients expressing gratitude and joy in receiving the shawls and lap robes.

This ministry begins with selecting a pattern and yarn and having the yarn blessed. Then comes the knitting or crocheting along with thoughtful prayer. The finished product is blessed before it is given or sent to a recipient. Sometimes the process is quiet and meditative, punctuated by the click of the needles while at other times the sounds of voices are heard talking, laughing, crying, and sharing. Both giver and receiver are blessed in this ministry.

## The Worth of All People

Every human being is created in the image of God. In Jesus Christ, God took on the limits of human flesh and culture, and is known through them. We, therefore, affirm without exception the worth of every human being. (An Enduring Principle)

We, the Community of Christ, believe in the worth of every human being as a Basic Belief and as an Enduring Principle. In remembrance of Racial Justice Day, I spent some time digging into our country's past history of racial *injustice*. Even before the first Europeans landed on the Shores of the Americas, the Spanish explorers slaughtered thousands of native Americans. Centuries later, as the colonist began their westward movement, these First People were stripped of their land and the freedom to live the only way of life they had known. In the mean time, slavery was introduced to this country, and innocent Africans were also denied their freedom. Sold and traded by colonist landowners, they, like the Native Americans, were not recognized as worthy of having any rights.

Sadly, this attitude of fear and prejudice would continue to bleed into the Asian culture as Chinese and, later, Japanese immigrants would come to America to live, work, and raise their families. Chinese-American author Gail Tsukiyama has written several beautiful novels based on the turmoil of the families in those countries as well as the American citizens of Asian descent. 
