I, **Stephen Farris**, was born in 1953 to James and Dorothy Farris. I was the fifth of seven children, two younger brothers died at birth. My mother was a convert to the church through the witness of a very good woman. After the death of my brothers, my mother became an agoraphobic or shut in. So we rarely went to church. Never-the-less my next older brother and I never

suffered for teaching. My earliest memories of my mother are of her sitting in a rocking chair reading and teaching us from the three standard books. She also testified to us of her own and others' spiritual experiences.

As I got older I began to prayerfully study and witness on my own. When I was old enough, I began to attend church and to follow preaching series in Independence, MO. I found that I was lacking social skills which held me back, but I was mentored by many good men and women.



After going to work, I found a fruitful field for my witness of Jesus Christ. All of my teaching as a child, my mother told me, was to prepare me to serve God and his only begotten. I found that witnessing had very many rewards as I became acquainted with God through the Holy Spirit and through much expanded study. I have taken nearly every Temple School class and still study constantly.

At work I was elected to lead my Union Local as its chairman. Doing this enabled me to understand how to use authority. Shortly after that I was called to the priesthood and was called three times to different offices in seven years. I was used in many different responsibilities in my congregations and was moved by the stake to another congregation to help organize it for growth with younger people. In 1993 I was severely injured at work and eventually moved to Florida because cold weather causes me a great deal of pain.

After a period of inactivity, I returned to the church but never felt comfortable there. When I started coming to the Bradenton/Sarasota congregation, I felt from the moment I entered the door that I had come home. This is a wonderful congregation, and I hope to attend and serve here for many years to come. You all are easy people to love and I do love my sisters and brothers in Christ.



Before that I watched them on a black and white television as their taped performance was used as a "human interest" piece on the "Huntley/Brinkley Report". They sang "I Want to Hold Your Hand", and I was hooked the moment I heard their sound. Thanks to my wonderful wife, my 60th birthday was spent in the 10th row of a Paul McCartney concert in Miami!

As the years past and the four boys from Liverpool became a worldwide phenomenon, they evolved into cultural leaders encased in a world divided by war. It was the 60's. Let us be mindful that what we reflect into the world shines most brightly when it comes from an inner glow. Let us all do the work it takes to place peace into our own lives. Just, *IMAGINE!*

Developing Disciples to Serve

As we continue on this journey, the Mission of Jesus Christ is what matters most, as told to us by President Steve Veasey. We need to live our lives with the spirit of Jesus in us. In today's world many great things are happening with all believers. We are encouraged to promote these great things and not dwell on all the negative things that are in the news. The Mission of Jesus Christ is very strong today. It is happening all around us, we just need to open our eyes.

It is very important to step back periodically and reflect what is happening in the congregation associated with each step of the missional process. We need to ask ourselves, "How do we embody and live the concerns and passion of Christ? How are we doing? What have I done to fulfill the Mission of Jesus Christ?" These are hard questions and we must dig deep to fully answer them. It's not an easy task to be truly honest with ourselves. But through prayer, talking to God and using holy listening, we can answer these questions. To do this, I am suggesting we put it in the form of prophetic questions (essential questions) that help us see and live God's future as individuals and signal communities of justice and peace. Once we have defined the essential questions, we can pray and discern together for the answer. A few examples are:

In the first chapter of Mark, Jesus proclaims, "The time is fulfilled, the kingdom of God has come near, repent and believe in the good news." This pronouncement, posed as a question could be: "What would it look like if the kingdom of God was to come a little closer to this place?"

In the fifth chapter of Luke, Jesus is inviting the disciples to cast their nets into the deep water after fishing all night long. This invitation, phrased as a question could be: "How is Jesus calling me to let go of some control and follow his movement into the depth of other people's lives?" Or, "How am I being called to slow down and be more attentive to the prompting of the Spirit leading me into relationships with others?"

Jesus shared many sayings and stories, intentionally, to disrupt the status quo with new insights and ways of being disciples. I invite you to find a related scripture to what we are doing in our congregation and form it into a question. Send these to me and we will introduce these at the Congregation Touch Base meetings (the next meeting is March 24). If we get enough questions, we could have a special prayer night.
