



Many vacationers rely on a global positioning system to get them easily to a destination. But in every season of life, God sends us on *vocation* -- following his call to both feed our passions and serve others. Our "Calling," Frederick Buechner said, is "where (our) deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."

But is there a GPS for *vocation*? It's not as detailed or predictive as we'd like. It

doesn't name our destination at the outset, and it offers general instructions rather than specific directions. And we may end up "recalculating" our life route more often than our vehicle GPS recalculates our vacation route.
