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Lent: To the Cross and Beyond

Do you want to be a Spirit-filled disciple of Jesus Christ to a greater degree than ever before? Then daily do the spiritual disciplines that will bring the transformation you have dreamed of in your heart. This is the only way we give God permission to change us. And the only way that change into the image of Christ can happen. The invitation from God is there. "Come, journey with my Son on the road to the cross and find new vision, new promise, and new hope. And feel the King coming ever closer." Amen.

Remember, God rejoices in each small step taken. The Lenten journey is one step at a time. Let's do it!

More of the story will be shared at the Maundy Thursday service at 7:00 pm; how Jesus broke bread and drank wine with the disciples - how Jesus washed the feet of the disciples - how he was betrayed and crucified the next day.

Traditionally, Lent is a season of confession and penance, a time to empty ourselves so we can be ready for the good news of Easter. Each week in the morning worship service an additional candle will be extinguished, leaving the table darker and darker. The promise of Lent reminds us the day will come when the shadow of the cross will be replaced by the light of new life.

Wednesday evening Prayer and Praise services will be held at 7:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall each week except April 1. Come and share with others who are travelling the Lenten journey.


Greeting 101 - aka, Welcome People to Christ

Abolish Poverty, End Suffering First Fund-raiser

"Let's buy a goat or two. How many chickens can we buy? Toothbrushes? What about toothbrushes? Do we have enough for two hens, a rooster, and a piglet? How much does it cost to provide meals for an orphan for a month? Shoes! We need to buy shoes. How much money do we have left to spend?" These words were heard as young and old poured over the catalog of Outreach International.

On Sunday, February 15th, a lunch was held by the **Abolish Poverty, End Suffering** initiative team to raise money to send to Outreach International in the first quarterly "Reach In and Reach Out" mission. Contributions of loose change had been collected during the previous three months in the "Reach In and Reach Out" bucket each Sunday. In addition, contributions were received on Sunday before the lunch, bringing the total to approximately \$1,335.00!

After sharing a simple meal of beans and rice, the participants got down to the business of deciding how to spend the money raised. Each table had \$325.00 to spend on items they thought were important to the lives of people who live in poverty. There was much discussion, passionate conversation, and compromise as the lists were finalized. It was a blessing to hear our children passionately proclaim how we should help other children in the world who lack such basic needs. Not only did our children learn, but so did we!

Here is what was chosen:

1 - Mosquito Net

3 - Pair of Chickens

1 - Stock a Clinic and Immunizations

2 - Pair of Goats

5 - Pair of Shoes

1 - Share of Water Well

30 - Toothbrushes and Dental Hygiene Lessons

1 - Fishing Kit

1 - Goat and Chicken

1 - Girl's Education

2 - 2 Hens, 1 Rooster and 1 Piglet

1 - Orphan's Meals for a Month

In addition, we had an undesignated contribution of \$93.03. While Outreach International cannot promise that the contributed funds will be used to purchase these specific items, they do promise that the money will go toward a project that is desperately needed. This was a fun project, but also a project with an important lesson for all who participated.

Thank you to each of you for your contributions of the heart. This was a great way to practice mission and outreach to those in need.

Our Father's Cupboard: We Are Family

Each month after our third Saturday food pantry distribution, I fill out a report sheet with the statistic information of how many families we served, how many persons that equates, when, where and other minimal information. I then send it, along with our next food order to the Manatee Food Bank. Although that sounds fairly routine, our congregation's food pantry is so much more.

Our volunteer staff that faithfully comes in on Wednesday delivery day must unload a truckload of food boxes, open them and then shelve the contents. This requires much physical labor. We have been blessed to have **Amber Hart-Cooper** and **Tobin Cooper** join our team. Tobin, a fifth grade student at Manatee Charter School, works side by side with our adult crew, and has been a tremendous asset to our team. On Thursday mornings when we bag the food, yet another team comes in to fill the donated Publix paper grocery bags. Each bag (75-90 total) is filled completely full with enough food to make several meals. **Rick and Randi Primrose** are a welcome addition to our team. Both are full time Publix employees and have much experience! Along with **Calvin Long**, a former retiree from the US Postal Service who spent many of his retirement years as a Publix employee, we can say we have quite a professional team.

Now we come to our distribution Saturday. This is when our big, extended family joins us. The Saturday team dons their name tags, and prepares the sign-in registration tables. The distribution crew sets out the traffic cones, gets the carts ready, and prepare to greet the waiting clients. Did I say clients? We greet them with hugs and smiles. We inquire about their health issues, family concerns, and welfare. We greet them by name. We laugh with them, cry with them and pray with them. We notice who *didn't* come and make sure anyone new is made to feel that they are welcome. Oh, the food? Delivered to and loaded into their cars by our staff.

Yes, we are a family; a big community family bound by a God who loves each and every one of his children equally. You are an important part of our family, too. Each can of food, box of cereal and dollar you donate to our food pantry will make a difference in the lives of our sisters and brothers throughout our community. The hands of many and the effort of an entire group were required to build these massive stone sculptures. The Inukshuk celebrate our working together. The Inukshuk act as a reminder to all of us that our efforts are appreciated, and the difference we make today, does count in all our tomorrows.
