

What Are the Youth Up To?

With summer camps at Deerhaven just around the corner, it is time for a fundraiser. On **May 15th**, after church, the youth will be hosting a **Soup and Salad Lunch**. The money raised will go toward camperships. Please plan to attend and help our youth have the opportunity to attend camp and make new friends while learning about God.

The youth are also planning a trip to the Holy Land Experience in Orlando sometime this summer. This past February we had a fund-raiser for this trip and raised over \$500. The youth would like to thank you again for coming and supporting this activity.

Many are probably aware that the youth have been participating in a **Shoebox Project** for several years. We are in need of items again to fill the shoe boxes. Deodorant for boys and girls are needed as well as toothbrushes, toothpaste, brushes, and combs. You can put your donations in the green container in the Information Center. At present we have plenty of soap, shampoo, and conditioners.

If you don't know about our **Shoebox Project**, we would like to bring you up to date. Shoeboxes are filled with personal hygiene items for teens. Our youth have been donating them to a local teen shelter for several years now. Many of the teens who come to the shelter have no personal items with them. The teens are allowed to stay at the shelter for no more than two weeks. The shelter has run-aways from home or conflicts at home. Their parents have made arrangements for them to stay in the shelter. While the teens are in the shelter they receive counseling and the help they need to go back home. The shelter we chose to contribute to does not receive the same funding that other local shelters receive. The shelters have people who sponsor teens and donate money, but everyday personal hygiene items are something the shelter has to provide. When we go to the shelter with our shoeboxes, there is much excitement from the staff. We have been told that it is like Christmas day. This project is one that I know personally that our youth enjoy doing and lets them feel like they are making a difference in other teen's lives.

Thank you to all who have given items to the Shoebox Project and all other fund-raisers.

The Parables of Jesus; What do They Mean?

Several years ago I asked a group of middle school children to share with the group something they knew about Jesus. Most shared the obvious: Jesus is the son of God, Jesus died for us, Jesus arose from the dead, Jesus performed miracles, and so on. One young man told that Jesus liked riddles. When pressed to elaborate he said, "Jesus told riddles and people had to figure them out." I knew then he was referring to parables.

How often have any one of us read a parable of Jesus and found ourselves reading it over a few times to fully understand what Jesus wanted his listeners to know. Sometimes they do seem like a riddle. When Jesus preached before a crowd or even his disciples, he was speaking to ordinary people. He wanted his lessons to be relatable to people of that time and place. The English word *parable* is Greek in origin. It is from the Greek words that puts together two words: bole (to throw) and para (alongside). A parable is then a comparison of an obvious (understood) truth and a truth that is not so easily understood.

For the next several weeks the Adult Sunday School Class will be studying the Parables of Jesus. Did you know there are 41? Through this study we will discover how we can apply the lessons within Jesus' parables to our lives today, and hopefully solve a few "riddles" along the way!

Prevent Human Trafficking

We often read frightening stories of human trafficking in third world and underdeveloped countries and question why more isn't being done to protect the innocent victims of this unspeakable crime. The sad truth is, human trafficking is one of the fastest growing crimes worldwide. Even more disturbing is the harsh reality that our own Bradenton and Sarasota communities have not been immune to the perpetrators of human trafficking.

Fortunately, through the efforts of law enforcement, dedicated citizens and legislators, the Church Women United are taking a forceful stand against this inhumane and unjust evil. Dr. Brooke Bellow, Founder of More To Life Champion Leadership Academy, a co-ed school for at risk children from ages 10 to 18, has traveled throughout the country meeting with law enforcement agencies, legislators, intervention and when necessary, restoring lives of human trafficking victims.

Church Women United Manatee has committed to actively participate in the education and prevention of human trafficking. On Saturday, October 8, 2016, we will host a conference and invite all women including middle and high school age girls to come and learn how we can prevent, protect and be aware of human trafficking. All sessions will be age appropriate. Guest speakers are Dr. Bellows, representatives from Selah Freedom, an acclaimed organization that works with survivors, and Linda Daniels from the Manatee County Sheriff Department.

This conference will take place on **Saturday, October 8, 2016, at St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church**. More details will be released in the late summer. Breakfast and lunch will be provided. There will be no charge for this event. This is your opportunity to take a stand for justice and preservation of human dignity. Mark this event on your calendar now so you can plan to attend.
