Reaching Out to Little Souls

For several years now, *Community of Christ* women have actively participated in the Church Women United of Manatee County. This international organization is dedicated to peace and justice ministries, and the joining together women of interdenominational faiths from around the world brings forth positive changes in our global communities. Our local chapter is no exception. We currently give yearly financial support to 13 different nonprofit social service agencies in Manatee County. Many of our CWU women also volunteer their time as well.

After learning of a serious need for shoes for local school children here in Manatee County, our "Soles to Little Souls" ministry was formed. Our goal was to collect as many new pairs of shoes as we could, with a goal of three distributions per year to students in various county schools. Monetary offerings for shoes are used, with the help of Payless Shoes, to purchase shoes at a discounted price.

During the summer months, *Community* of Christ Compassionate Ministries team designated our "Reach In/Reach Out" donations to the Church Women United (CWU) "Soles to Little Souls" ministry. Thanks to our generous congregation, we were able to present CWU of Manatee County a check for \$660.00. That's about 50 pairs of new shoes! CWU is going into their third year of this ministry, and I cannot begin to express the joy on the faces of the students who receive these shoes, and the gratitude of the teachers who see the needs of the children in their classrooms every day. Your pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and dollars have blessed many little souls with new soles!

Our Father's Cupboard: Reaching Out with Love

For over twenty years, Bradenton/Sarasota Community of Christ has been providing food for families in our community. While our food pantry has changed in many ways throughout the years, we have continued to look for ways to be a welcoming people who share what we have with love and generosity. The people we serve are our extended family; their lives are important to us. Whether they are struggling with health issues or other concerns, we try not to miss the opportunity to let each one know they are loved and that we care. Hugs are always in abundance!

Although we are open once a month, we serve an average of about 70 households. That adds up to over 300 people who are being fed! Since we pre-bag our food, which is shelf stable, we can accommodate agency referrals for those who are in need of emergency food assistance.

We always welcome extra hands when unloading the truck and stocking shelves, bagging food, and assisting with carrying bags of food to cars. Thanks to Publix Supermarket, we have an ongoing donation of full size paper bags, which hold enough food to feed a family three meals a day for at least three days. Yes, those bags are heavy!

We are the *Community of Christ*. We are dedicated to pursue peace and to fulfill the mission of Jesus Christ. Always remember that when we open our hearts to see Christ in others, they will see Christ in you and me. While our goal is to prevent physical hunger, our mission is to make sure that no one leaves without receiving nourishment for their spiritual hunger as



well. Your continued support of food, money and volunteer donations are changing lives in our community.


People visited with one another while others played games, went fishing, or played
