

A Month of Parables

During the month of October, each Sunday morning's worship will include a parable told by Jesus. In your worship preparation, it would be helpful if you read the appropriate parable before the service each Sunday.

The Mustard Seed - Luke 17:5-10

The parable of the mustard seed follows a difficult lesson on forgiveness. The apostles ask the Lord to *Increase Our Faith* so that they could follow His teachings. Sunday, October 3, Elder **Bona Lee** will be sharing her insight as to how we can increase our faith. Priest **Carolyn Deering** will be presiding over this Communion service.

The Persistent Widow - Luke 18:1-8

If a complaining widow can get an unjust judge to hear her case, how much more can our constant prayer move a loving God to act on our behalf? Jesus tells us to *Pray Always*. Evangelist **Karen Palko** will be speaking on this theme with Elder **Jo Fenn-Martin** leading the service on October 10.

Ten Healed of Leprosy - Luke 17:11-19

The lesson of this parable is that when we *Rise and Go*, we must go responding to what we have received. Jesus sees the leper and responds; the healed leper sees the healing and responds to God's generosity. Guest ministers, High Priest Bruce and Elder Ronda Wooderson from Australia, will share with us on October 17 with Teacher **Fay Beers** presiding.

The Pharisee and the Tax Collector - Luke 18:9-14

The Pharisee's attitude is one of exclusion. Jesus' ministry is all about inclusion. This parable teaches against judging others. We are advised to follow the lead of the tax collector in this parable and humbly pray, *Have Mercy on Me, a Sinner*. Priests **Heather**

Zacchaeus the Tax Collector - Luke 19:1-10

Zacchaeus has an intense desire to see Jesus as he is passing through Jericho; so intense, in fact, Zacchaeus climbs a tree to get a better view. How does the crowd

"see" Zacchaeus and how does Zacchaeus surprise everyone? On October 31, Elder **Penny Cramer** will lead this service with Priest **Scott Cramer** bringing the message.

A Call to Serve: Reaching Out Into Our Community

Each member of the Pastorate that serves our congregation has specific areas of ministry for which she is responsible. This sometimes includes everyday tasks that require attention. Retrieving phone messages became my daily "task". While I occasionally have to delete random sales calls, I have logged many messages from people who were in need of emergency assistance. It is through these calls that I have been privileged to meet and talk to brothers and sisters in our community who have been pushed to the brink of homelessness and hopelessness.

Many of these individuals and families live within five to ten miles of our church doors. Most have very little (below poverty) income, with few employment prospects. Transportation is an ongoing problem. Their housing, which takes a huge dispropor-

tionate amount of their monthly



money, is largely substandard.
Having food on the table is
a daily concern. While I
can make some phone calls,
or file some forms to get
them immediate help, what
they also need is the hope of

Jesus Christ. As I have watched

literally hundreds of children stream into the arms of waiting parents on street corners after school, spoken to moms with one and sometimes two or three tiny babies and toddlers, or listened to the stories of how one family shares the little they have with those who have nothing, God has given me a clear message that we are the ones he is calling to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ into this community. The time has come for us to leave our comfort zones and go where God is leading us.

As we look ahead to reopening our food pantry in November, we need to look at the possibilities that abound in open door ministry: Spiritual counseling, Bible study, children's Bible stories; the list is endless. Going yet another step farther, in home visiting with prayer and Bible study, after school tutoring and Young Peacemakers Clubs are just a few of the ministries that we, using our gifts and talents can offer. The call has been made to us. Are we, as a united body of Christ followers, ready to answer God's call?

Our Father's Cupboard Update

During the last week in July, the pantry was closed because some of our volunteers, including the pantry manager, **Patti Benjamin-Bovee**, had health concerns and were ready for a much needed break. It was apparent that we needed to reevaluate **Our Father's Cupboard** and to come up with a plan that would open up new volunteer opportunities for *all* of our church family. A Task Team consisting of **Jim Brougher, Brad Martin**, and **Dave Robertson** have begun the process of assessing the program which includes plans to restructure the pantry work space.

Distribution will take place (for now), once a month on the morning of the third Saturday of each month. This will allow volunteers to come in at designated times either during the day or evening to pack the paper grocery bags with food. Nonperishable items only will be distributed. Many of you have requested these changes to allow our youth and young to middle-aged adults the opportunity to be involved in the ministry of the Cupboard. We will have a table set up in the Information Center during the month of October for people to sign up to help. Our target opening date is November 20th.

When the remodeling is completed, we will open up the doors and invite all to come and see the improvements. Thank you for your support and continued prayers; God has heard them and will use all of us to continue this ministry.

In my youth I spent time on my uncle's farm. There I witnessed God through the simplicity of farm life. On the farm my uncle raised corn, beans, and produce. He also raised horses, cattle, pigs, and goats. I did not realize it at the time, but looking back, I now see my uncle's stewardship over his crops and livestock. Even his stewardship over his wife and two children that lived with him on the farm was evident. For all the groups on this farm were his flock whether it was livestock, his family, hired hands, or the crops he raised.

Flocks have need of a shepherd and my uncle was a great steward of God's green earth, his farm. On one occasion a female, nanny goat was standing at the fence that surrounded the barn yard. She was jumping up and down, bleating her lungs out, butting her head into the fence and carrying on so loudly that my uncle came out of the barn to see what it was about.

The next day as we prepared the goats for milking, yesterday's distressed nanny was all over my uncle with head butts, bleating, and touching him with her nose. She was thanking her shepherd for love and caring guidance.

That day I saw my uncle and his goat as I also saw my Precious Shepherd Jesus. I saw the value of saying thanks and giving praise to God for all we have been given. Let our voices and witness always be heard!

Aaronic Ministries

As a congregation we have been blessed with many priesthood through the years. We currently have four Deacons, six Teachers, 12 Priests, 17 Elders, two High Priests, and four Evangelists listed in our congregation's directory This includes those who are ordinands, winter residents, and those who have been superannuated as well as active and inactive members. Regardless of the numbers, it is important that within each Community of Christ congregation, the priesthood quorums, both Melchisedec and Aaronic, have a clear vision of planned ministry.




Coming Florida Mission Center Events:

Balance ending September \$(7,126)


